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Who we are




HELVETAS Swiss Intercooperation



Selected approaches



RESULTS-BASED FINANCING

To ensure that skill trainings lead to employment, Skills and Knowledge for Youth (SKY) program in Ethiopia applies a results-based financing approach, based on the successful experiences in Nepal. Only part of the training costs is paid to the training provider after the trainees graduate. The remaining part is paid once the graduates are placed in a job or self-employed and earn above the minimum wage (gainful employment). More than 1700 young people were trained in the first phase. 69 % are in gainful employment. SKY collaborates with the local administration, the TVET regional office and associations and enterprises.



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LABOR MARKET INSERTION

Labor market insertion services enable a smooth transition to the world of work, aiming to increase stable employment or self-employment among disadvantaged youth. The Enhancing Youth Employment (EYE, funded by SDC) project in Kosovo has provided support to two commercial job portals by increasing awareness among private sector employers on the value of the job-matching services. The key to success was to ensure the willingness of private sector employers to pay for services. Job matching services became a potential for growth and main channels for youth to access information about job vacancies.



THE OPPORTUNITY GROUP APPROACH

The opportunity group approach is a participatory process that guides groups of young people through different steps of self-assessment and skills development towards job orientation and entrepreneurial initiatives. It was developed from the LearnNet Approach in the Skills for Rural Employment (S4RE) project in Kosovo, which builds on the understanding that the owners of the problem are also the owners of the solution. Helvetas has developed a manual on how to implement the approach based on its experiences in the S4RE project in rural Kosovo.



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SECOND CHANCE PROGRAMS

In the department of Borgou in Benin, 54% of children either do not attend school or have dropped out – due to lack of infrastructure and teachers, but also for economic and socio-cultural reasons. PAEFE (funded by SDC) facilitates the development and implementation of bilingual non-formal basic education adapted to the local context for excluded children. A bridging system eases the transition of graduates toward the formal education system or to VET. To ensure quality education, local teachers were trained in the new approach. Governmental entities are strongly involved, financially and for accreditation.



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Selected project engagements



Helvetas designs and implements several hundred development projects each year. They are sustainable and scalable as they are locally embedded. We support our partners from the civil society, local private sector, and local and national governments for effective collaboration and to effectively fulfill their responsibilities.

Leave No Girl Behind (LNGB) aims to support marginalized girls and young women to get an education and practical skills that allows them to support themselves and their families. Activities are designed to address the barriers to girls' education to achieve improved learning outcomes, improved linkages to further opportunities and improved community and government capacity to sustain girls' and young women's education.

This advisory mandate focuses on the topic of employment in rural areas of Africa, with a special focus on young people. Thematic emphasis includes skills development, entrepreneurship development, employment in peripheral regions and fragile contexts, and sharing practical experiences in the development and implementation of approaches to promote rural employment.

Youth Employment Through Skills Enhancement (YES) project aims to improve the living conditions of 3,000 economically and socially disadvantaged young women and men in Tanzania through skills and gainful employment. The project eases the labour market insertion through the results-based financing approach and supports training providers to develop partnerships with the private sector to enhance the practical side of training. Learning through mobile phones will make training content accessible to the geographically and socially marginalized.

The goal of HoHalé is to contribute to the improvement of income and employment opportunities for young people, women and rural families in the Cascades region through a skills development system managed in partnership with the private sector. It focuses on agricultural vocational training, promotion of sustainable agricultural sector and development of market systems to increase productivity and improve the processing and marketing of agricultural products. Of the 350 youth trained since the start of the project, 340 reported an improvement in income.


The overall goal of Enhancing Youth Employability (EYE) is to have 5,000 young women and men gainfully employed, 20,000 better skilled and 100,000 having gained access to better career information. In the first phase alone, 2,590 jobs were created (target: 2,000). This was achieved in a socially inclusive and sustainable way through systemic interventions of improving skills with a dual VET approach that meet market requirements, better job-matching information, career counselling services and private sector involvement for a more conducive business environment that generates new job opportunities.

Strengthening Household Access to Market and Employment (SHAMERTO) enhances the skills and improves employment opportunities for workers and entrepreneurs in agro-food processing enterprises. The projects focuses on agricultural and forestry sectors and works on a national VET reform to improve the quality of teaching and learning and for a better labor market insertion. Already in 2018, 51 training providers ensured job orientation and placement services for graduates, and 1824 graduates found gainful employment after being trained.

The overall objective of the Enhanced Skills for Sustainable and Rewarding Employment (ENSSURE) project is that Nepali workers, particularly from disadvantaged groups, benefit from continuous employment and an improved standard of living. Experienced workers act as “roving instructors” in companies to coach young job seekers on the job, following an apprenticeship. The private sector is strongly involved and benefits from this expertise to enhance productivity.

The goal of the Skills for Employment (S4E) project is that 1'500 young men and women from Magwe Region in Myanmar are gainfully employed or self-employed. S4E cooperates with youth organizations to mobilize 2,000 trainees, capacitates employers to provide on-the-job training and supports training institutions to impart life and business skills. Business associations and training institutions, as key partners, deliver market-oriented training.


